These figures are for Inquests held in the respective years. They show a dramatic drop, both absolutely and relatively, for backyard infant drownings in 1976. The figures for actual dates of such deaths show an even more dramatic improvement. 38 of these fatal accidents have now occurred in the area covered by these Courts since July 1974. 7 occurred in the second half of 1974, 11 in the first half and 12 in the second half of 1975, and 3 in the first half and 5 in the second half of 1976. Undoubtedly this improvement is to be attributed to extensive press, radio and T.V. publicity and the efforts of such organisations as the N.S.W. Water Safety Council, S.P.L.A.S.H. and the Sutherland Shire Resuscitation Committee, which have resulted in greater public awareness of the dangers involved, of the need for effective safety barriers and better knowledge of emergency resuscitation methods.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENT DEATHS - CATEGORIES 6, 7 & 8

TOTAL 438

The table indicates the status (driver, passenger, etc.) of traffic accident victims together with sex, age and alcohol factor. The figures certainly understate the alcohol factor. Many victims survive for considerable periods after injury. Where death occurs more than 24 hours after injury, blood alcohol analysis is not ordered. This accounts for the 76 (17%) "not known" cases. Survival even for a few hours will result in a lower reading and may result in a "nil" reading. The figures relate only to victims. They do not include drivers involved in fatal crashes but who survive them and frequently have consumed considerable quantities of alcohol.

As for previous years, the figures show that those most at risk on the roads are pedestrians - 175 out of 438, or 40%, of whom 74 (42%) were pedestrians aged 60 years and over.

In all categories male victims exceeded females, in most overwhelmingly.

Of all victims, 211 (48%) had not yet reached the age of 30 years. 140 out of the total of 438 (32%) were drivers, riders or occupants of motor vehicles who were in their teens or twenties.

104 victims (24%) had blood alcohol levels of .08% or more. In 1974 and 1975 this proportion was 21%.
